

# 2023 Fact Sheet: Out of State Residents Licensed to Practice Nursing in Hawai'i

### How many nurses licensed to practice in Hawai'i live out of state?

- According to PVL's <u>2024 Geographic Report of Licenses</u>, the following percentage of nurses licensed to practice in Hawai'i have addresses outside the state:
  - o 713 (34%) of 2,070 LPNs
  - o 19,723 (53%) of 37,278 RNs
  - o 1,433 (47%) of 3,061 APRNs
- This is the first year since the Center for Nursing has been monitoring these data that less than half of RNs licensed in Hawai'i are residents of the state.
- For all licenses, the percentage of nurses who are residents of Hawai'i is at an all-time low. See our 2014-2024 summary of nursing license counts.

### Are out of state (OOS) nurses licensed in states other than Hawai'i?

- 33% of all nurses (LPNs = 56%; RNs = 32%; APRNs = 44%) report only being licensed in Hawai'i.
- Of the 67% of nurses who are licensed in at least one other jurisdiction, they are most likely licensed in:
  - o California (61%)
  - o Washington (40%)
  - o New York (34%)
  - o Oregon (34%)
  - o Nevada (33%)
- At the time that these data were collected, none of these states were members of the Nurse Licensure Compact. Washington enacted legislation to join the NLC a month after data collection ended.
- Of the nurses who report having a license in at least one jurisdiction other than Hawai'i, 76% report that they hold a multistate license issued by an NLC member jurisdiction.

### Are OOS nurses available for employment in Hawai'i?

- 94% of OOS nurses report that they are currently working.
- Of the OOS nurses who are currently working:
  - o 99% are working in a role that requires their nursing license
  - o 85% are working in a full-time position
  - o 43% have been working in their current position for 5 years or longer
  - o 25% are employed as travel nurses
- Among the OOS nurses who are NOT working, their primary reasons for non-participation in the workforce include:
  - o Taking care of home or family (27%)
  - o Being retired (21%)
  - o Being on a break from working or nursing (18%)
  - o Being unable to find desired employment (8%)
  - Having a health condition or disability (6%)
  - o Being enrolled in school (4%)
  - o Some other reason (16%)
- These data indicate that the OOS nursing workforce is predominantly employed in full-time nursing roles and are geographically stable. Moreover, nurses who are not currently working mostly cite reasons unrelated to being unable to find work as a nurse as the reason for their current employment status. Taken the data suggest that that the majority of the OOS nursing workforce is not available to work in Hawai'i.
